LEGO CHILDREN'S FUND DONATES \$100,000 TO TOWN OF ENFIELD EARLY CHILDHOOD PROGRAMS

The LEGO Children's Fund has generously donated \$100,000 towards Enfield Early Learning Programs, including the Family Resource Center, KITE, and the future Early Learning Center at the former HB Stowe Elementary School. The Family Resource Center, which opened in 2012, is currently located at the Hazardville Memorial School, and will move to the

new Enfield Early Learning Center, at 117 Post Office Road this winter. The Family Resource Center provides a broad range of family support and early childhood services that strengthens parents in their role as their child's first teacher. KITE will open an office in the new Center at the same time. The support of the LEGO Children's Fund demonstrates its

TOWN OF ENFIELD VOLUNTEER INCOME TAX ASSISTANCE PROGRAM (VITA)

The Town of Enfield will launch a free tax preparation program to assist low to moderate income families. Free tax preparation will be available from February 2 through April 15, 2015. The program will be located at Enfield Neighborhood Services at 100 High Street in Enfield, CT.

The Enfield VITA site will be open every Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday from 6:00 p.m.

to 9:00 p.m. and on Saturday from 9:00 a.m. until 5:00 p.m.

Volunteers training and certified by the IRS assist working families who have adjusted gross income under \$52,000 to file their income taxes.

CONNECTICUT ENERGY ASSISTANCE PROGRAM

The Connecticut Energy Assistance Program helps households pay for primary heating expenses such as gas, oil, propane and other deliverables. Under certain circumstances, those who have heat included with rent may also apply. The program typically runs from September to May, however the first fuel deliveries are not available until November 12. If the household's primary heating costs are included in your rent, you may also apply for assistance.



Income Guidelines – including homeowners and renters that pay separately for heat. At this level, renters are not eligible if heat is included in the rent.

In addition to the above income guidelines, there are asset restrictions. These assets include savings, checking and other accounts. For those over 59½ years of age, restrictions include retirement accounts such as IRAs. For Homeowners, the asset limit is \$10,000, for renters the limit is \$7,000. Applicants must provide proof of household income for the four week period prior to their appointment. Other documentation such as utility bills, social security numbers and dates of both are also required. For a full list of requirements please contact Neighborhood Services at (860) 763-6396. Basic benefits range anywhere from \$80-\$505 but additional crisis benefits may be available depending on circumstances.

5/1/15	Last day that a household can apply to establish its eligibility for benefits unless the household is utility heated and has a shut off notice for its primary source of heat.

5/29/15	Last day to submit deliverable fuel bills.

How to Apply

All applications are done in person (unless you are homebound). Applicants can call Neighborhood Services at 860-253-6396 or CRT at 860-560-5800 to schedule local appointments. Applicants can also schedule appointments by visiting the Neighborhood Services office at 100 High Street, between the hours of 9am and 5pm.

SIDEWALK SNOW REMOVAL

With the winter season now upon us, the Town of Enfield would like to remind residents of the town ordinance regarding the removal of snow and ice from sidewalks. In short, Town Ordinance #74-103 states that the owner or occupant of any building or land bordering upon any street, square or public place within the town where there is a sidewalk is required to remove all snow, sleet and ice within a period of 24 hours after the cessation of the snow, sleet or ice. To aid residents in determining when the 24-hours have elapsed, a countdown clock can be found on the Town's website, <http://www.enfield-ct.gov>. End of storm notifications are also posted on Enfield Television.



All residents and snow removal contractors are reminded that the blowing, throwing or plowing of snow into public street or way is a violation of Enfield ordinance #74-102. Snow that is blown, thrown or plowed into the streets by residents or contractors creates an unnecessary safety hazard to all motorists.

Lastly all residents are reminded that no motor vehicle shall be parked on a public street or highway in town during a snow or ice storm that has an accumulation of 3 inches or more unless otherwise posted; objects such as basketball hoops must be removed as well. This is a violation of Enfield ordinances #82-63 and CT Gen Statutes Sec 19a-335. Parking ban announcements and additional info can be found on the Town website, DPW's Twitter feed (Follow @EnfieldDPW) as well as on Enfield TV, WFSB-TV Channel 3, WVIT-TV Channel 30 and WTIC radio.

REFUSE COLLECTION HOLIDAY SCHEDULE

The Town of Enfield Public Works Department wishes to advise Enfield Residents that due to the observance of Christmas and New Years Day, Trash and Recycling collections for Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday will be on the normal schedule. Thursday, December 25 and Thursday January 1st will be delayed one day and pickup will be on Friday.

The Transfer Station will be closed during the Holiday season on December 25th and January 1st.

Yard waste collections will no longer take place on Fridays until spring with the last collection taking place on Friday, December 12th.



THINK SAFETY FIRST WHEN BUYING A FIREPLACE OR WOOD-BURNING STOVE

Fireplaces, pellet stoves and wood-burning stoves are attractive home additions for their looks and ability to reduce heating bills. When not installed properly, these solid-fuel burning appliances can be a life-threatening hazard.

If you're in the market for a pellet stove, fireplace or wood-burning stove do some homework before purchase and installation. First, contact your local building inspection department. In Connecticut a permit is required before installation and inspection by a trained professional.

"The Connecticut State Building Code requires that you purchase a pellet stove, fireplace or wood-burning stove that is permanently labeled by the manufacturer and an approved testing and inspection agency" said Enfield Chief Building Official James D. Taylor. "Work with your builder or contractor to find the best interior location. That decision will be based on the chimney's path."

All units should come with installation instructions that show minimum clearances from combustible materials as well as approved venting methods. Whether a professional does the job or it's a do-it-yourself project, Taylor recommends following all safety precautions and installation instructions exactly.

"Once installed, inspected, and approved, the homeowner needs to read the operation manual carefully to understand how the pellet stove, fireplace or wood-burning stove works," Taylor said. "You have to properly adjust dampers that affect air flow and you need to have the appliance and its venting flue cleaned regularly. If not cleaned, creosote builds up in the vent pipe or chimney and creates a fire danger."

Prior to the heating season Taylor recommends a professional chimney cleaning for safety and for efficient burning. Inside the home, clean out the firebox regularly. Don't place material that could ignite on top of the pellet stove, fireplace or wood-burning stove.

Taylor also suggests contacting your insurance agent. Many insurance companies require a rider to the homeowner's policy and a final inspection report from the local building official.
